## 10 Basic Rules

Stefan, aged 12, was asked to write a set of guidelines giving his ideas on what basic rules he thought children should live by. Here's what he wrote:

**1 Don't hurt people or animals** Everyone – and every animal – has the right to live without someone else hurting them.

**2 Don't steal** Society would fall apart if everyone just took what they wanted.

**3 Always tell the truth** Some people say that there are times when it's ok to lie. But I think small lies lead to big lies.

**4 Don't fight** Fighting never solves anything. It only causes resentment and someone's likely to get hurt.

**5 Don't damage other people's property** If you go around damaging other people's property you can't complain if they do the same to yours.

**6 Don't be greedy and selfish** Wanting more and more things, and only caring about yourself, causes all kinds of problems.

**7 Take care of the environment** If we don't take care of the environment, we'll destroy it.

**8 Take care of your body** Our bodies are the only ones we've got, so it makes sense to look after them by not doing things like smoking or taking drugs.

**9 Respect other people's opinions and beliefs** I'm not very religious, but some of my friends are. I think it's important to respect other people's beliefs.

**10 Stand up to what you think is right.** Don't let anyone bully you into doing things you don't want to do. Always do what you think is right, whatever the consequences.
