When can I do Work Experience?

The Work Experience lasts for five days. We would like you to confirm the date with your employer by 22nd March 2024 to ensure all necessary arrangements can be made.

We will not be able to accept any later applications. Once we have received the **Work Experience Agreement – Parent Form** we will then contact the employer you have put down who will need to provide all the paperwork by 24th May 2024 otherwise the work experience cannot go ahead and students will need to remain in school.

Where can I do Work Experience?

Where you choose to do your Work Experience is a decision between you, your parents/carers and your intended employer. Where the employer is local, our Careers Team also completes a risk assessment. Your safety is very important us. You also need to consider how you are going to travel to your work placement.

Getting Started

Why choose Work Experience?

Imagine how you would feel to have had the chance to explore a future career, to work with experts, to see what they do and how they got there. Building new contacts and new learning experiences can help you to decide what you want to do after school. The opportunities and feedback you receive can also help in future college, apprenticeship or sixth form applications.

- Research employer websites.

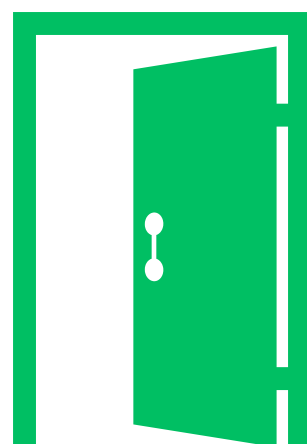
Talk to our Year 11 students about their work experience. Many of our students spent their week in local primary schools, leisure management, hair salons, barbers, architects, construction, events management, libraries, estate agents, retailers, motor engineering workshops and automotive showrooms. Ask them for advice.

If you are struggling to find a placement or have run out of ideas, **talk to Miss Dias. Our SEND and Pastoral teams** can also help if you need extra support and our team can liaise with the employer on your behalf.

How to approach an employer

Approach with confidence. They won't bite.

If visiting in person or enquiring by telephone, smile and say hello. Introduce yourself and explain that you are a Year 10 student who has the opportunity to do a work experience. Tell them you would love to work with them and ask if there is anyone who could help make this possible.



Use your school email address and always check your spelling and grammar. Begin your email by addressing your contact properly - For example, Dear Mr Davies. If you haven't been given a name, use Dear Sir/Madam. Introduce yourself as above. Sign off properly, e.g. Kind regards, Jack Jones. A sample email



Communication matters

A sample email: focus on relevant skills & interests.

How to deal with rejections

It is hard when a potential employer says no but please do not take it personally. They may not have enough staff to supervise you or they may already have lots of other commitments. In some instances, students must be 16 years old. Remember to reply politely, thanking them for their consideration. If you feel confident, ask if they know anyone else who could help.

The School Process

Return the agreement form ASAP



Once your employer has confirmed your work experience opportunity, return the agreement online form [Work Experience Agreement – Parent Form](#) yourself as the parent/carer.

Mr Ruffell will confirm with your employer and arrange to visit them to conduct a risk assessment. We will then send onto the employer the relevant forms we need them to complete once you have completed the online form.

Collect your Work Experience Booklet



One week before you attend your Work Experience, collect your Log Book from Miss Dias. Use this at work to keep a diary of the tasks you did, people you worked with, the skills you used. Return the completed copy, including evaluations to Miss Dias as soon as you come back.

Other questions that you might have

What if I find an employer who isn't local? If the employer is not locally based, it becomes difficult or impossible for us to conduct a risk assessment. However, this doesn't mean you can't go. Please contact Mr Ruffell for details.
